JUDGE (RETIRED) KENNETH L. FIELDS

Judge Kenneth L. Fields is a retired Judge of the Superior Court of Arizona in Maricopa County, Phoenix, Arizona. He presided over civil, juvenile, criminal, probate, special assignment, and family court calendars. From February 1993 through June 1995, he served as the Presiding Judge of the Domestic Relations Department (Family Court), Superior Court of Arizona, in Maricopa County.

From November 29, 2002 to June 2007, he was one of three (3) judges state-wide assigned to the Complex Litigation Court, which had a paperless (electronic filing) docket. Judge Fields participated in the establishment and organization of the Complex Litigation Court in Arizona as a part of this assignment. The Complex Litigation Court was assigned not only complex business and commercial litigation, but it was also assigned other types complex cases such as fraud/white collar criminal cases, dissolution of marriages cases involving business assets and election/voter fraud cases.

Since his retirement as an active judge, Judge (ret) Fields has worked as a re-call judge doing both civil and criminal cases in various courts in the State of Arizona in addition to having an active mediation and arbitration private practice. He is the presiding commissioner for a 5-person arbitration commission deciding disputes between the Navajo Nation and the Hopi Tribe (both Native American tribes). In addition to civilian courts, Judge Fields, a retired Army officer, acted as a Military Trial Judge for the Arizona National Guard presiding over Court-martials until September15, 2015.

He taught Mexican Judges, prosecutors and public defenders in 2007-2008 as a member of a U.S.-Canadian team. Judge Fields has taught at Law Schools in Russia, Ukraine, Serbia, and Kosovo. In April 2014, Judge Fields had a paper presented at the Azov Legal Conference in Berdyansk, Ukraine on Business Courts in the United States. In 2004 prior to his retirement, Judge Fields presented a class on U.S. Civil Procedure to European Judges in Madrid, Spain as a part of a comparative law course. In April and September 2014, he was a guest lecturer at the University of South Wales, Cardiff, United Kingdom, on Alternative Dispute Resolution.

Judge Fields was the Program Co-Chair at a symposium on international mediation and alternative dispute resolution at the Center for International Legal Studies (CILS) in Salzburg, Austria in 2015, 2017 and 2019. In 2015, he was inducted into the Congress of Fellows for the Center for International Legal Studies.

Judge Fields has been a settlement Judge for the Superior Court ADR Department since 2007 doing civil cases primarily.

ROBERT F. COPPLE

Robert F. Copple, JD, PhD, Copple & Associates PC, is an arbitrator, mediator, investigator, and litigation strategy consultant. He helps to resolve disputes involving technology and science issues, including intellectual property, biotechnology, information technology, cybersecurity, telecommunications, high tech manufacturing, the environment, and health care. He was on the ground floor applying alternative dispute resolution (ADR) to the rapidly growing cannabis industry. Bob frequently lectures on law and technology issues both in law schools and professional organizations. He has authored more than 40 books and articles including the ABA Treatise, "Biotechnology and the Law" (Editor-in-Chief and coauthor). Bob is recognized as an organization leader, both statewide and nationally, serving as the chair of the board for the Arizona State University (ASU) Center for Law, Science, and Innovation, chair of the ADR Section of the Arizona State Bar Association, and member of the Intellectual Property Section Executive Council, among other positions. Bob worked as a litigator and regulatory negotiator for large law firms in Denver and Phoenix and was Senior Litigation Counsel for Motorola. In addition, he was a judicial law clerk for a Federal District judge and for a state supreme court chief justice. He received his BA, MA, and JD from the University of Nebraska, and his PhD from The University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. Bob was the executive editor of the *Nebraska Law Review* and is a Certified Information Privacy Professional (CIPP/US).

- Personal Information:
 - Information that makes it possible to identify a specific individual
 - **■** Direct:
 - Social Security, Passport, Credit Card and Driver's License Numbers
 - Street Address, Telephone Number, Email Address
 - Sensitive Information: Financial, Health and Academic
 - Indirect Combinations That Identify Individual
 - ■54-year-old female law professor at ASU who teaches Ethics

- The Rights of Individuals
 - **■** Notice:
 - Privacy Policies and Procedures
 - Purpose for which Data Is Collected, Used, Retained and Disclosed
 - **■** Choice and Consent:
 - Choices Available to Individual
 - Implicit or Explicit Consent
 - Data Subject Access:
 - **■**To Review, Correct and Update

Controls on Information

- **■** Information Security
 - Administrative, Technical and Physical Safeguards to Protect PI

- Information Quality
 - Accurate, Complete and Relevant Information for Identified Purpose

- **■** Information Lifecycle
 - **■**Collection
 - **■**Only For Purpose in Notice
 - Use and Retention
 - **■**Use Limited to Purpose in Notice
 - Retain Only as Long as Necessary to Fulfill Purpose
 - Disclosure
 - Only for Identified Purpose
 - With Consent (Implicit or Explicit)

- Information Management
 - Create Policies
 - Assign Accountability
 - **■** Monitor Compliance and Enforce
 - Procedures to Address Complaints and Breaches

US Privacy Law: A Patchwork of Federal and State Laws

- No Overriding Federal Privacy Law Like the EU
- Federal Law Focus on Industries and Types of Records
- State Law All 50 States Have Some Form of Digital Privacy Law
- Co-Regulation
 - Adherence to Industry Code Deemed to Satisfy Law
- Self-Regulation
 - Industry Establishes Standards and Enforcement
 - No Parallel State or Federal Law
- Contract To Impose Legal Requirements on Third Parties

Breach Response

- State and Federal Privacy Law Response to Data Breach
- Generally Require:
 - Investigation Determine Whether a Breach Has Occurred
 - Contain and Analyze Incident
 - Recover Devices, Limit Access, Audit
 - Notification
 - **■** Affected Parties
 - Relevant Agencies and Attorneys General
 - **Implement Follow-up**

Mitigating Actions: Data Security

- Encryption
- Anonymization
 - **■** Remove Identifiers
 - **■** Scramble Data

- Demonstrate Lack of Injury
- May Eliminate Notice Requirement

Federal: Federal Trade Commission

- The FTC Has Broad Authority Over Data Management and Breach
 - Section 5:
 - "... unfair or deceptive acts or practices in or affecting commerce ..."
 - Application Failure to Comply With Own Terms and Conditions
 - **■** Concurrent Jurisdiction With Other Agencies
 - **■** Does Not Apply to:
 - Nonprofits
 - Banks, Federally Regulated Financial Institutions,
 - Common Carriers Communications and Transportation
 - Enforcement Limited to Injunction and Consent Decree

Federal: Financial Institutions

- Fair Credit Reporting Act (FCRA)
 - Regulates any consumer reporting agency that furnishes a Consumer Report used to establish credit eligibility
 - Includes businesses that use reports or furnish information
 - Fair and Accurate Credit Transactions Act (FACTA) part of FCRA
 - Provides additional consumer protections including rules for disposal of credit records
 - Enforced by Consumer Financial Protection Bureau (CFPB) and FTC
- Gramm-Leach-Bliley Act (GLBA)
 - Financial Institutions
 - Regulates collection, storage, notice and sharing of customer information
 - Enforced by CFPB and State Attorneys General

Federal: Healthcare

- Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act (HIPAA)
 - Strict, detailed requirements for the collection, security and dissemination of <u>electronic</u> patient health information
 - Applies to Healthcare Providers, Health Plans, Healthcare clearinghouses and business associates.
 - Enforcement US Department of Health and Human Services, Department of Justice.
 - FTC and state Attorneys General may enforce for unfair and deceptive trade practices.
- Genetic Information Nondiscrimination Act
 - Prohibits
 - Health Insurance Companies from discriminating based on genetics
 - Insurance Companies requiring applicants to get genetic screening
 - Employers using genetic information for employment decisions

Federal: Education Records

Family Education Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA)

- Provides students with control over disclosure of and access to their education records
- Disclosure only permitted if:
 - Information not personally identifiable
 - Consent by parent or student
 - Health and safety purposes
- Students have right of access
- May request corrections

Federal: Children Privacy

Children's Online Privacy Protection Act (COPPA)

- Applies to Websites Likely to be Visited by Children Under 13
- Requires Notice of Data Collection
- Parental Consent Required
- Enforced by the FTC

Federal: Telecommunications and Marketing

FTC and FCC Coordination

- FTC Telemarketing and Consumer Fraud and Abuse Protection Act
- FCC Telephone Consumer Protection Act
- Rules governing US National Do Not Call Registry
 - Including Robo Calls
- Exceptions:
 - Existing business relationships

Controlling the Assault of Non-Solicited Pornography and Marketing Act

Rules govern form of email solicitations

State Law: Arizona ARS § 18-522

- Application:
 - person that conducts business in this state and that owns, maintains or licenses unencrypted and unredacted computerized personal information
- ■/ If Breach:
 - Notice within 45 days of discovery
- If more than 1000 people, notice to:
 - Impacted individuals
 - Consumer reporting agencies and Attorney General
- Content of Notice
- Form of Consumer Notice written, email or telephone contact, post on website
- Notice not required if "breach has not resulted in or is not reasonably likely to result in substantial economic loss to affected individuals."

State Law: California

California Consumer Privacy Act -- Effective January 1, 2020

- Applies worldwide if entity controls or received information from California residents and meets revenue or consumer number requirements
- Gives residents a right to:
 - Access to Data.
 - Deletion of Data
 - Opt out of sale of information
 - Minors must opt in
 - Businesses may not discriminate against consumers who opt out

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EU: General Data Protection Regulation

- Applies to all businesses that do business in the EU and/or collect PI about EU residents.
- Penalties Up to \$20 million or 4% of revenues
- Consent Opt in
- Data Protection Encryption and Anonymization
- Right to be forgotten
- Stringent data security requirements
- Mandatory breach notification
- Privacy by design
- International data transfer
- Enforcement?

 - ▶ If the Personal or Confidential Information is not Necessary, Ask Parties to Clean the Data
- Harden Your Systems
 - Up to Date Protective Software and Assessment
- Know Your Systems and Where Sensitive Data is Stored
 - Vendors
 - **■** The Cloud
- Limit Access to Sensitive Information
- Encryption
- Employee Training
- Backup and Redundancy

What is Online Dispute Resolution?

Online Dispute Resolution (ODR) is an online platform that utilizes technology to facilitate resolution of court matters.



Applying Technology to Resolution Process

"Simply defined, online dispute resolution (ODR) is a digital space where parties can convene to work out a resolution to their dispute or case...ODR leverages technology to provide the same customer-centric "anytime/anywhere" access that internet provides for online banking, shopping, dating, healthcare, genealogy, and other activities." ¹

Barriers to Access

Economic Challenges

- Lost wages
- Absence(s) from employment
- Cost of child care
- Transportation costs
- Cost of legal representation

Geographic Barriers

- Distance from courts
- Lack of public transportation
- Disability and physical limitations
- Scarcity of legal aid and lawyers

Psychological Difficulties

- Confusion about the law and the process
- Apprehension of facing the court
- Anxiety or even fear about the legal outcome

Accessibility

- ODR allows users to resolve their court matters electronically, including by way of mobile devices
- Increases access to justice by removing the requirement for court users to travel to the courthouse






Family Law Implementations

- Petitions for Mediation
- Modification of:
 - Legal Decision-Making
 - Parenting Time
 - Child Support
 - IV-D only
- Enforcement of:
 - Child Support
 - IV-D only



Petition for Mediation for Legal Decision Making or Parenting Time Issues



Child support is not calculated during mediation.

If it is a non IV-D case, parties will have to file a separate petition to address child support.

If it is a IV-D case, Conciliation Court Services will send the AAG notification of outcome of mediation.

Scottsdale Municipal Court Plea by Mail/Telephone


- Pilot Plea by Mail/Telephone in Online Setting
 - Prosecutor and defendant can exchange documents necessary to enter a plea on specified misdemeanor cases
 - Prosecutor can send plea and associated documents through the platform
 - Defendant can accept or reject plea



Potential Challenges

- Staffing Resources
- Parties who do not have a computer
- Parties who are not computer-literate
- Confirming user identity





Online Dispute Resolution – Family Court

• Family Court Rules currently require a sworn written verification for "a stipulation or agreement that substantially changes the terms of a legal decision-making or parenting time order. . . "

 Family Court Rules effective 1/1/2019 require these documents be notarized for all agreements including post decree matters

Opportunities

- Less time off from work and family obligations for litigants
- Can be accessed 24/7
- Saves on transportation costs for litigants
- Better setting for those that won't meet face-to-face
- Saving time for mediators

Advantages

Mediation Has Gone Global

A mediator can host attendees from anywhere in the world.



We live in a shrinking world but mediation is the leading form of dispute resolution.

Advantages, Cont'd Cost

Mediation is increasingly being used worldwide because it saves money.

Avoids delays associated with litigation;

Costs are significantly reduced for travel associated expenses



Advantages, Cont'd Traditional Mediation Advantages

- √ As in real-time, online you are directly involved in negotiating your own agreement;
- No settlement can be imposed upon you (as happens in litigation or arbitration);
- The parties select the services of an experienced neutral who can assist in negotiations, and in achieving a quick settlement.

- √ The ability to explore alternative solutions that may not have been considered by the parties or are not possible or available through the courts;
- It is possible to re-establish a positive relationship between the parties once the dispute is resolved;
- √ Neither party is prejudiced or has sacrificed any legal rights or delayed significantly any ultimate settlement by the legal process if mediation is unsuccessful.
